




Zonal Trampolining competition

Basketball

Our U16 Boys basketball team have worked hard to improve their performances in recent months despite having a fairly small squad of 8 players. The boys started their campaign off with a 57-31 defeat to Bishop Challoner where the introduction of zonal defence, which they had not applied in competition before, took time to bed in. Harley was the top scorer in the match with a series of good jump shots and lay-ups. Most notably the 'engine room' he showed in getting up and down the court the whole match was noted by the squad.

The next match was a very tough assignment in the U16 county cup against Purbrook Park who travelled all the way up from Portsmouth. My goodness they were giants. Two players being 6ft 5" and 6ft 7". It was the first time that I had seen two players dunk on one of my teams and their height and range was just too much for us, running out 78-28 victors. However, this performance was a mile better than their game against Bishop Challoner both offensively and defensively. It gives me a lot of hope for their last couple of games this season, the next of which will be against Everest after Easter.

Our U15 Boys basketball got back to action against Brighton Hill last week picking up where they left off defeating BHCS 69-16 in a brutal display of scoring on the fast break. 3 players were into double figures in scoring with both Arvin and Joey top scored with 16 points each.

We are frustratingly still awaiting the confirmation of who our opponents are in the semi-final of the U15 county cup. I hope this will be announced shortly.

Finally, our U12 Boys basketball team played against Bohunt in the County cup on Monday. It was a very tight game going into the 4th quarter only trailing by 2 points. Sadly, Bohunt went on a late run, ending up 22-16 winners. A notable performance was put in by Carl, who scored all 16 points for our team. Finishing is the main area of improvement for this team and when they do, they will be become a formidable team because the way they move the ball is outstanding. Plenty to look forward to next year.

Football

This year was a year of change for the Year 8's. There were plenty of new players who had not been involved previously, which included a number of Year 7's making the step up to help the Year 8's. The results may not have been as intended, but plenty of progress was made. Each performance had a steady improvement, and the players were extremely unlucky not to have beaten The Vyne in their final game. The team is moving in the right direction, and I am excited about their progress and their games for next season. Well done all involved!

The Year 9 boys have returned a much improved side from last year's competition. They have played in two hard fought contests. In an end to end game against Cranbourne the team gave everything for the entirety of the match, including hitting the post. Despite many good attacks Cranbourne were unable to get passed the new look defence of Jenice, Aleksander, Joshua and George. The team was unfortunate to not find themselves ahead but two spectacular goal keeping performances including Ollie who was playing the year up kept the game at 0-0 until the final couple of minutes. The team was unfortunate to concede in the final two minutes of the game.

With multiple players returning from injury the team has high hopes for their final game of the season which will be played after the Easter break.

Next term

In the summer term our extra-curricular timetable will considerably change as it always does to allow the 'summer sports' to take centre stage.

Athletics, cricket, rounders and tennis will all be available to come and try out. There will also be plenty of fixtures in those different sports, some of which already have booked fixtures in our calendar. As a result, Netball, Football, Trampolining and Rugby will take a short break before returning in the Autumn term.

Finally, the Basingstoke Schools District Athletics event will be held at Down Grange Athletics track on Wednesday 19 June. This event will be for Year 7-10 and as per normal will be an all day event. I would love to see as many students at our athletics clubs as possible this year. I hope for a much improved performance from our squads this time around so that we can push up the leaderboard.
